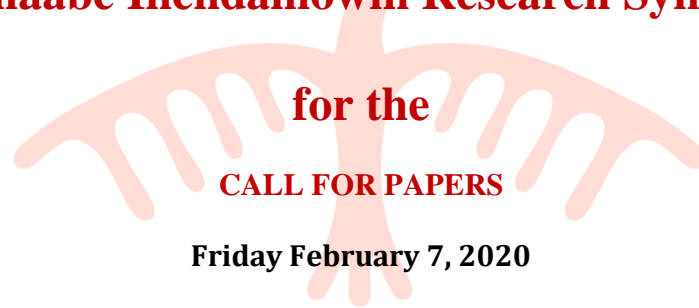


Anishinaabe Inendamowin Research Symposium

CALL FOR PAPERS

Friday February 7, 2020

The Anishinaabe Initiatives Division and Anishinaabe faculty and staff at Algoma University and Shingwauk Kinoomaage Gamig are hosting the fourth bi-ennial Anishinaabe Inendamowin Research Symposium with the theme “*Mino-Bimaadizidaa* (Let’s have a good life)”. The purpose of the symposium is to enrich research through the integration of Anishinaabe inendamowin (*Inendamowin* being an Anishinaabe word signifying *thought*).

Both established and emerging researchers (including all levels of students) are invited to submit abstracts for papers, workshops, panels, and posters. Submissions should foreground aspects of Anishinaabe thought, knowledge, protocols, and/or research methodologies, and are welcome from across all disciplines.

Potential topic areas may include, but are not limited to:

- Recovering Anishinaabe research practices;
- Anishinaabe research outside the academy;
- Cross-cultural pedagogy;
- Affirming/revitalizing Anishinaabe knowledge traditions and language;
- Research involving local communities; and
- Any other topics in the area of Anishinaabe knowledge and research.

The symposium will create opportunities for Anishinaabe and non-Anishinaabe scholars, as well as traditional knowledge keepers, to engage in dialogue about Anishinaabe thought while providing mentorship for students who are in the early stages of their engagement with research. The symposium aspires to foster a supportive learning community inclusive of traditional knowledge keepers, academic scholars, students, and other educators.

CRITERIA OF ABSTRACT FOR PRESENTERS

1. The title of the abstract should be in **BOLD CAPITAL LETTERS** followed by a blank line
2. The body of the abstract should contain 300 words in English
3. The font should be 12 PT ARIAL with SINGLE LINE SPACING

Note: The final selection of abstracts will be reviewed by the Research Symposium Committee. Authors will be notified by **Monday, December 9th** if their abstract has been accepted/not accepted.

PRESENTATION FORMATS

PAPER

Each paper will be limited to one 20 minutes session and presenters are encouraged to allow time for a 2 to 4 minute discussion period at the end of their presentation. The primary presenter must keep within the allowed time.

WORKSHOP

The workshop is a 90 minute interactive and experiential session which aims to illustrate a set of techniques in practice. The audience should be encouraged to participate in the learning of the techniques for themselves, or for the work setting.

PANEL

The panel is a 90 minute session which centers on thematic discussion by no more than 4 presenters to explore issues and new ideas facing Anishinaabe researchers in academia or in the work setting. The primary presenter is responsible for organizing and coordinating the presenters and the presentation, submitting the abstract, introducing the topic and panel members and keeping within the time limit. Questions for the discussion must be prepared in advance, and identified in the abstract.

POSTER

Posters must highlight the integration of Anishinaabe methodologies in the research process. Posters are displayed for viewing throughout the conference at specific times during the conference. The authors will be present to talk with interested participants.
